# Session Overview

As essential democratic public spaces and centers of civic engagement, civic landscapes must be created as spaces inclusive to all. This session will assist designers in understanding how to integrate equity into various scales of civic spaces by exploring strategies in Boston, Philadelphia, and Vancouver.

## GREG BURRELL, ASLA OLIN

Greg's work spans multiple typologies and scales, working both nationally and internationally. He is passionate about the creation of public landscapes that foster community, create common ground, and help re-establish towns, cities, and universities as important cultural centers. Greg recently completed two transformational public spaces: Dilworth Park adjacent to Philadelphia's City Hall and the Wyandanch Transit Plaza in Babylon, NY. In addition to these new public spaces, Greg also has significant experience in large-scale planning, including the AIA award-winning Master Plan for the Central Delaware River and the planning and implementation of the John Lewis Student Center at Georgia Tech.



## MAURICIO GOMEZ, ASLA SASAKI

Mauricio is a landscape architect who specializes in urban landscape projects and has over 20 years of related professional experience working on projects around the world. Mauricio's work centers on large-scale public spaces where he focuses on designing and creating places for people. His previous professional background also includes experience as a civil engineer, so he brings an interdisciplinary approach to much of his landscape practice. Mauricio has worked on a number of projects in the Boston area, and most recently led the project team for the new Boston City Hall Plaza.



#### NEIL HRUSHOWY CITY OF VANCOUVER

Neil is the Director of Community Planning in the City of Vancouver's Department of Planning, Design and Sustainability. His team is responsible for the planning and implementation of Community Plans and Major Projects. The City Design Studio, also within Community Planning, is responsible for design policy from the city-wide to area-plan scale. Finally, the Downtown Eastside Team and Chinatown Transformation Team offer a unique model for planning and implementation of area plans within at-risk and cultural communities, respectively. Neil earned his PhD in City and Regional Planning from UC Berkeley and previously worked in San Francisco as the Principal Urban Designer in the Planning Department.
